Unite! & Compassion in Action Overview

Who is Unite!?

Unite! is a network of churches across Metro-Atlanta (over 150 churches, to date) from a wide variety of denominations, cultural, and ethnic backgrounds, working together to serve the community through Word & Deed ministry. Unite! is not an organization and does not have paid staff. Leadership is provided by senior pastors, missions pastors, and church staff. Currently, there are over 25 churches providing leadership to the Unite! effort. Two separate leadership teams have formed in northeast and northwest Atlanta, with additional leadership teams forming in other parts of the city.

What is Unite!?

The heart of Unite! is for churches to join together to serve our communities in such a way that God would transform our city for His glory. Unite! might best be thought of as a relational network among churches to better enable “The Church” of Atlanta to combine efforts of prayer, serving, and celebration for maximum influence and impact throughout our city.

What is Compassion in Action Weekend?

Compassion in Action Weekend occurs on the 1st weekend in October each year where churches throughout metro-Atlanta plan service projects and partner together to serve the community in a spirit of unity, sharing the love of Jesus Christ to those in need.


Vision for Community Transformation

The vision of Unite! Compassion in Action Weekend is to mobilize churches to serve the community together on October 2 & 3, with a vision for ongoing community service throughout the year.

Getting Started

The following steps are suggestions to help your church in the process of coordinating service projects and mobilizing volunteers for *Compassion in Action Weekend*.

1. Develop a plan for your congregation's involvement.
2. Consider partnering with another church in your service projects.
3. Recruit a *Compassion in Action* Coordinator for your congregation.
4. Choose service projects for your congregation.
5. Cast vision of *Compassion in Action* and projects to your congregation.
6. Recruit service project leaders to oversee service projects.
7. Post service projects online at www.UniteUs.org by August 20.
8. Invite volunteers to sign up for service projects.
9. Cast vision for volunteers to continue serving throughout the year.

Compassion in Action

Choosing Ministry Partners and Projects

If you already have an organization you work with to serve the needy in the community, we would encourage you to try to serve alongside them for Compassion in Action. Just remember: it might be best for your partner in the long-run for you to leave room for other congregations to serve alongside you so perhaps they can get involved there on an on-going basis.

If you are starting fresh or looking to expand your list of ministry partners:

- Choose ministry partners that are close to your church location. This will also allow you to build a more robust long-term relationship with these ministry partners and the people they serve. If you are working in an area that's not close to your church, find out about a few churches in that area that you would feel comfortable referring your contacts to. Encourage those churches to serve with you. Or, even better, ask those churches if there's any way you can help them serve their community.
- Keep the passions of your congregation in mind when choosing ministry partners. Much like each person was created with individual abilities, passions, and experiences, God created each congregation uniquely as well. If you think through the SHAPE components (see SHAPE Survey in the Appendix) in terms of your congregation, you will likely have a much easier time generating excitement and participation - especially for on-going work.

Look at page 15 for a great tool to help you evaluate existing and potential ministry partners.

When thinking about specific projects:

- Focus on projects that (1) allow the people needing help to be involved in the work and (2) that will build on their skills, intelligence, physical ability, and creativity. By including them in the planning and implementation, they will feel more valued.
- Take into account the gifts and passions of your members (see SHAPE Survey on page 14).
- See sample listing of project summaries on page 18 for ideas for your church.

Compassion in Action Registration Options

We strongly recommend using the Unite! website to post projects and the CIA2010 website for volunteer registrations, regardless of the size of your church. By having all of the CIA projects listed in one central access point, potential volunteers can see the many varied projects being offered that weekend and choose one which suits their passions, schedule and group configuration/family. It is a unique and glorifying experience for people of multiple churches to come together to serve side by side in a group together, building relationships. All churches welcome volunteers from any other churches. This is also a great way for a church which may not be organizing their own projects to have their congregation involved in serving that weekend through other church projects.

The following guidelines are proposed for those churches not planning on using the central website for project posting and volunteer registration.

Small Congregations and Congregations with 1-5 Projects:

We advise you to keep “registration” as simple as possible. Your best bet is to develop a form you can then print out, send in an email, and/or put on your church website. When the forms are returned, you should make a copy of each form and file the originals for safe-keeping. Then you can either just work from the paper copies or enter the data into an Excel Spreadsheet or Word Document for sharing with church leadership and project leaders.

Large Congregations and Congregations with 6 or More Projects:

We again advise you to keep registration as simple as you can, but the more projects and people you are organizing, the more complicated it will be. Here are some options:

1. Create a database (or make a copy of another church’s) and put it on your church website.
2. Let your small groups find the projects and be responsible for staffing them.
3. Don’t have people register in advance. Just put them on buses when they show up (e.g. families with children go on one bus; people not able to do strenuous work go on another bus; etc.).

Compassion in Action Important Philosophy Priority Needs

“The kingdom of which Christ spoke was one in which the poor, the sick, the grieving, cripples, slaves, women, children, widows, orphans, lepers, and aliens - the “least of these” (Matt. 25:40) - were to be lifted up and embraced by God. It was a world order in which justice was to become a reality, first in the hearts and minds of Jesus’ followers, and then through the wider society through their influence. Jesus’ disciples were to be “salt” and “light” to the world (see Matthew 5:13-14). They were to be the “yeast” that leavens the whole loaf of bread (see Matthew 13:33). His was not intended to be a far-off and distant kingdom to be experienced only in the afterlife; no, Christ’s proclamation of the “kingdom of heaven” was a call for a redeemed world order populated by redeemed people - now.” *The Hole in Our Gospel* by Richard Stearns

Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen: to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke? Is it not to share your food with the hungry and to provide the poor wanderer with shelter—when you see the naked, to clothe him...? Isaiah 58:6-7

For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me. Matthew 25:35-26

The Spirit of the Lord is on me because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to release the oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor. Luke 4:18-19

We encourage you to use an exhaustive Bible concordance or an online concordance like www.biblegateway.com to look up all of the verses containing injustice, oppressed, prisoner, poor, naked, hungry, thirsty, sick, weak, widow, orphan, etc. You will be AMAZED to see God’s heart for the “needy” among us.

Give Them a Fish, Teach Them to Fish, and Tear Down the Fence Around the Pond

From *When Helping Hurts: How to Alleviate Poverty Without Hurting the Poor and Yourself*
by Steve Corbett & Brian Fikkert

Addressing material poverty is complicated. It is made up of three basic parts:

1. **Relief:** urgent and temporary provision of emergency aid to reduce immediate suffering from a natural or man-made crisis - provided only while a person is unable to help himself. Too often, this is what the church's outreach efforts are because the results appear to be immediate. However, only a small percentage of the poor in your community or around the world require relief. These would include the severely disabled; some of the elderly; very young, orphaned children; the mentally ill homeless population; and victims of a natural disaster.
2. **Rehabilitation** seeks to restore people and their communities to the positive elements of their pre-crisis conditions. This process should begin as soon as the critical situation is stabilized. The important feature of rehabilitation is that we should make sure we're working *with* the people we're helping. They must participate in their own recovery.
3. **Development:** an on-going process that ultimately allows the materially poor to support themselves and their families.

Guiding Principles:

- Do not do things for people they can do themselves including providing:
 - resources which might otherwise be provided by local businesses;
 - knowledge and ideas which might not even translate into their context anyway;
 - free labor which undermines their calling to be stewards of their own time and talents and might also be taking jobs away from local people; and
 - planning & managing initiatives that if planned on their own might lead to more buy-in and sustainability.
- Ensure participation of the affected population in the assessment, design, implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of the program.
- Only respond when the needs of an affected population are unmet by local people or organization due to their inability or unwillingness to help. Whenever possible, the first responders to a crisis should be the victims' family members, whether or not those family members are local (1 Tim. 5:3-4).
- Target assistance based on vulnerability and need, and provide it equitably and impartially. Flinging resources around undermines the development of individual and communal stewardship, responsibility, and capacity.
- Focus on the ASSETS of the community as opposed to the needs. Asking, "What gifts do you have?" affirms people's dignity.
- Broken systems need to be addressed in many cases.

The Spiritual Aspect

“The social gospel divorced from personal salvation is like a body without a soul; the message of personal salvation without a social dimension is like a soul without a body. The former is a corpse, the latter is a ghost.” *E. Stanley Jones, missionary to India*

“Community transformation is not about “Christendom”—placing Christianity or the Church at the center of society or trying to reestablish the church as the center of the community, but it is more like the kingdom leaven (Matthew 13:33) that is sown into all parts of society and lived out in such a way so that people in every sector...every domain know someone who knows and truly follows Jesus. Conversion is our ultimate motive but not our ulterior motive in loving and serving others. “Ultimate motive” means that we absolutely want every person on earth to be in a right relationship with God through Jesus. But “ulterior motive” means that we do acts of love and service towards others so that they become Christians (which could signify that if they don’t become Christians we stop loving and serving). It is important to remember that we don’t engage in the needs, dreams and pains of our communities so that they will become Christians rather we engage the community because we are Christians”. *To Transform a City by Eric Swanson*

The government can and does provide services to the poor and oppressed - often with kindness and love. Just meeting the need isn’t what sets us apart. Here are a few things to consider:

1. Prayer should permeate everything we do - before, during, and after.
2. Make sure everyone knows you represent THE CHURCH - - then make sure you represent her well.
3. Look for ways to interject God into the conversation.
4. A person’s worldview - the lens through which they see the world - can cause and/or worsen their material poverty. It shapes the way they relate to God, themselves, others, and creation. Faulty worldviews can be a major cause of material poverty. For example, violence and crime are a result of the way a person views life and material possessions, teen sex is often a result of the way a young person sees him or herself, etc. (*When Helping Hurts*)
5. The goal of our work should be to help people “understand their identity as image bearers, to love their neighbors as themselves, to be stewards over God’s creation, and to bring glory to God in all things.” (*When Helping Hurts*)
6. Part of our job might be introducing the community to God and helping them see what He has been doing for them since the beginning of time (*When Helping Hurts*). Find out what good things have happened in the community and what gifts they have. Help them see that those are from God. And, help them understand that the whole Bible is about God’s love for humanity and His relentless pursuit of a relationship with us.

Preparing YOUR Spirits

1. Come to serve, not to judge. Remember, you don't know the whole story, so you should never leap to conclusions about what people appear to have or not have.
2. Listen twice as much as you talk.
3. Remember that materially rich people often have "god-complexes" - a subtle and unconscious sense of superiority in which they believe that they have achieved their wealth through their own efforts and that they have been anointed to decide what is best for low-income people, whom they view as inferior to themselves. Remember that most of us also suffer from materialism. Pray against these things. Our relationship to the materially poor should be one in which we recognize that both of us are broken and that both of us need the blessing of reconciliation. Our perspective should be less about how we are going to fix the materially poor and more about how we can walk tighter, asking God to fix both of us. (*When Helping Hurts*)

Why Collaborate?

1. God designed us to work in partnership.
He called the twelve disciples together and sent them out two by two. Matthew 6:6b
We are many parts of one body, and we all belong to each other. Romans 12:5
2. It glorifies God by showing the world around us that we can work together despite our doctrinal differences. This is not a competition. We can overcome territorialism.
Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my disciples. John 13:35
I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one: I in them and you in me. May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me. John 17:20-23
Make every effort to keep yourselves united in the Spirit, binding yourselves together with peace. For there is one body and one Spirit, just as you have been called to one glorious hope for the future. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God and Father, who is over all and in all and living through all. Ephesians 4:3-6
3. We can do more together than we can each do on our own.
See www.StreetGrace.org for an example of a group of churches in the Atlanta area have been able to do - - something NONE of them could have done on their own.
4. It minimizes duplication of efforts.
5. We can discover gaps in ministry.

6. We gain credibility.
7. Complement each others' strengths and minimize each others' weaknesses.
Under his control all the different parts of the body fit together, so the whole body grows and builds itself up through love. Ephesians 4:16
...we are partners working together for God, and you are God's field. You are also God's building. Using the gift that God gave me, I did the work of an expert builder and laid the foundation and another man is building on it. 1 Corinthians 3:9-10
8. Each member of the partnership can do what they do best rather than spreading themselves too thin.
9. We can learn from each other by sharing best practices.
10. It provides accountability. We can ask each other, "Are we really doing anything that is truly transformational?"
11. We receive refreshment and encouragement.
